

We are going to have a go at a first draft together.


















Let's start by putting these pictures in the right order

Here we are using Rainbow Grammar to help us with our writing. The colours we are using are: green, orange and red.

Green is the subject of the sentence. These sentences are about Mary.

Orange is the predicate. This means everything else in the sentence.

Red is the punctuation. Here the capital letters are red and the commas and full stops are red.


