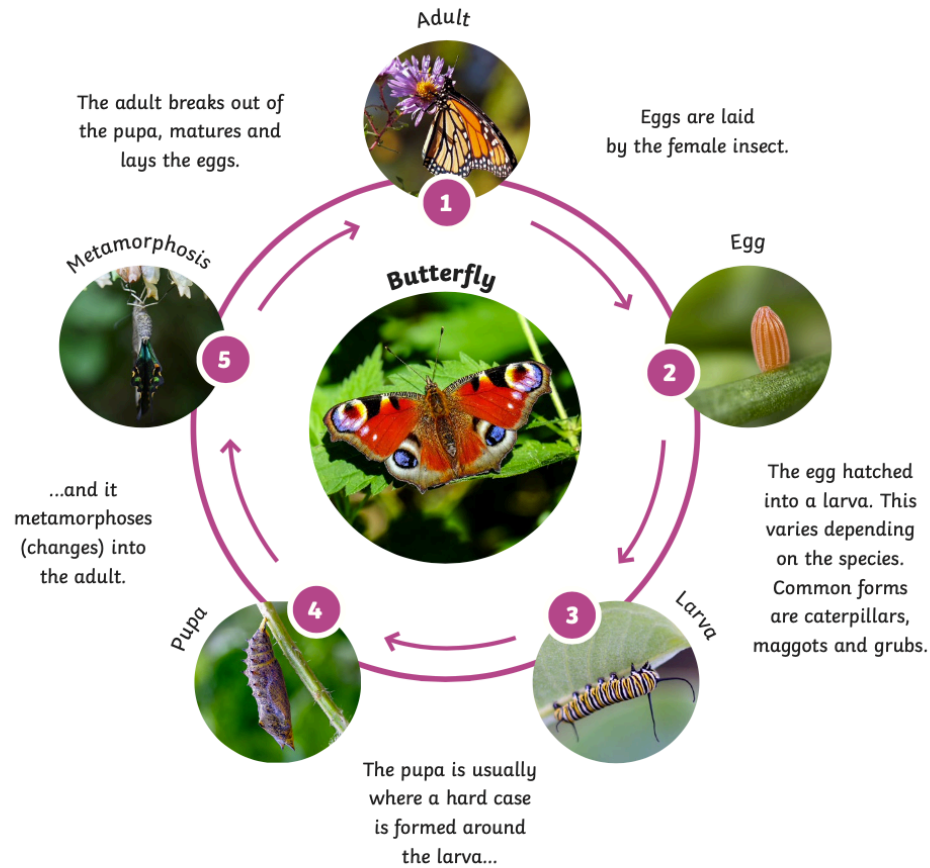

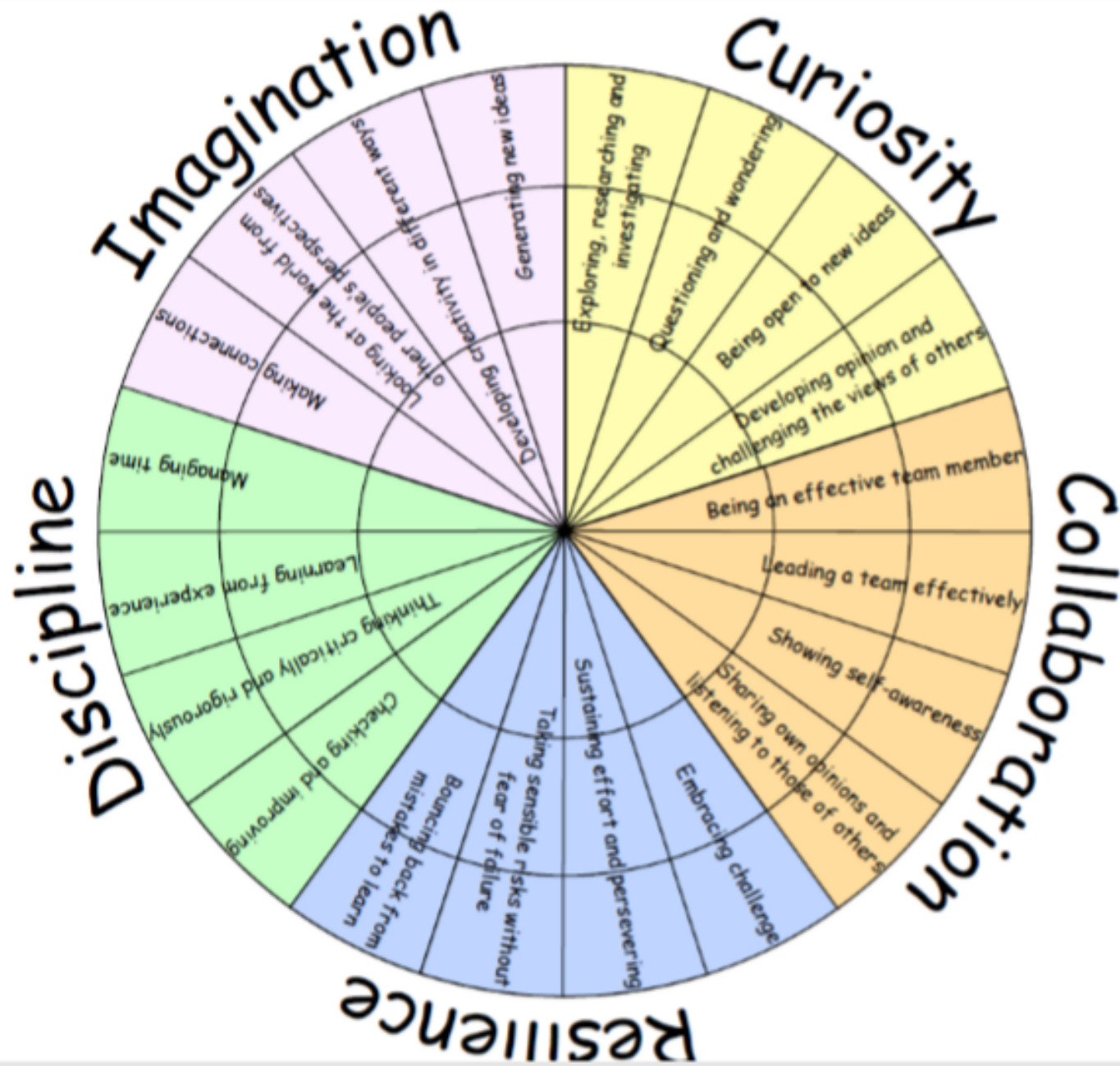

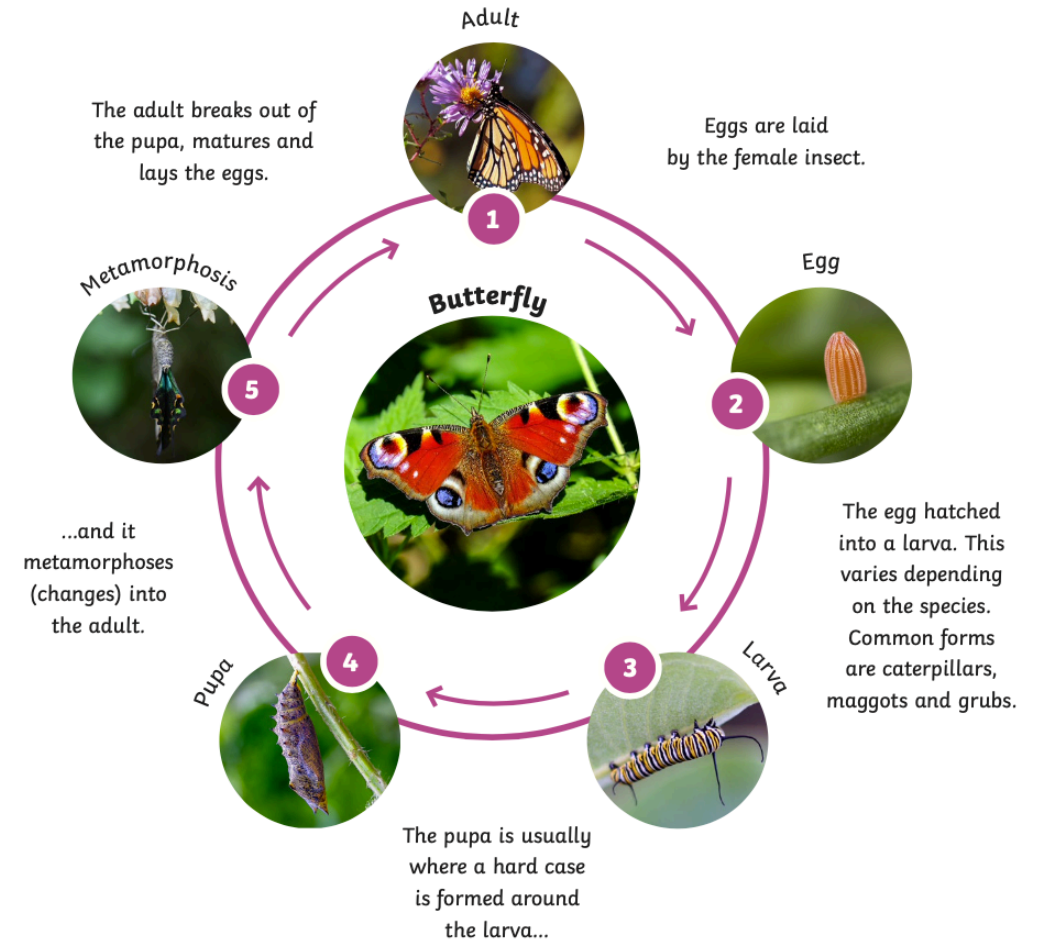

Vocabulary of a Butterfly Life Cycle

Caterpillar - the larvae stage of a butterfly.

Chrysalis - same as pupa, the third stage of butterfly life cycle.

Emerge - to come out of something.

Instar - another term for molting, shedding of skin.

Larvae - the second stage of metamorphosis, during which a caterpillar has new wings.

Life cycle - a series of stages through which an organism passes between recurrences of a primary stage.

Metamorphosis - a series of developmental stages often marked by body changes.

Molting - shedding of the skin, so that larvae can grow.

Pudding - when butterflies crawl all over the ground near shallow water.

Pupa - third stage of a butterfly life cycle, when larvae changes into adult. Also called Chrysalis.
